The Future of Charity Regulation: Lessons from International Experience

Across a wide range of countries, charity policy, law and regulation have undergone more change over the past two decades than during the previous century. What constitutes an effective model for charity regulation in an environment that is increasingly transborder, hybrid, commercialized, professionalized, and shaped by technology? What guidance might international approaches and experiments hold for Canada as the Trudeau government advances its commitment to 'modernize' the framework for charity regulation?

This one-day conference is a rare opportunity to hear from international charity regulators – from both established and new regulatory institutions – as well as from leading academics and nonprofit leaders.

Co-hosted by the Philanthropy and Nonprofit Leadership Graduate Program at the School of Public Policy and Administration, Carleton University, the Muttart Foundation and the Pemsel Case Foundation, the conference examines recent international developments in charity regulation and considers avenues for reform, assessing implications for regulators and for charities.
